

#### WHAT DOES KINDNESS MEAN?



Did you know you can access all our upcoming events and information on our website? In case your landlord hasn't passed along this information, here are a few tips to make living in our community enjoyable and stress free:

- All residents owners and renters must comply with association rules and regulations. These rules protect property values, preserve the nature of our community, and make life more enjoyable for everyone. If you need a copy of our rules, please contact the DSCA Admin office or your landlord for a copy. The association has the legal authority to enforce all rules, which we do - equitably and consistently. We don't like to take action against those who may not have received this important information, but it's our obligation to do so.
- Membership privileges are assigned to renters at the discretion of the homeowner. Homeowner's can either retain the privileges or assign them to their tenant. Once we have the assignment in place, renters will be issued Membership ID cards which will give you access to all the amenities and events of the Desert Shores Community.
- You don't have to own your home to be interested in your community. If you'd like to volunteer for a committee or other type of service to the association, we can't wait to meet you. Responsible, service-minded residents are the backbone of our association regardless of their ownership status.
- If your lease is about up, and you're moving away, we're sorry to see you go; but, please notify the DSCA Office so we can update the property's records.

Again, welcome to the Desert Shores Community! We want you to enjoy your experience here – perhaps enough to become an owner some day!

It costs nothing to be Kind... But putting on events and activities does require some funding! Thankfully the City of Las Vegas has a Neighborhood Partners Fund grant program that provides neighborhoods and homeowners associations, in the city of Las Vegas, the opportunity to get a share of the \$80,000 available for neighborhood grants every year.

Desert Shores Community Association has been the recipient of the NPF Grant in years past that has been used to fund events for the residents. Most notable and memorable was the 30th Anniversary Block Party held in 2018.

An association may apply for up to \$5,000, which must be matched by the neighborhood. At least 25 percent of the match must come from volunteer labor, valued at \$28.54 per hour. As much as 75 percent of the neighborhood's match can be from cash and/or donated supplies, equipment, or professional services.

Among other requirements and application procedures, grants of up to \$5,000 are available for projects that address a meaningful neighborhood need that transforms the community, occur within the city of Las Vegas, and will be completed within a seven-month period.

On July 20th, the City of Las Vegas approved our proposal for Desert Shores Kindness Month and we are now full steam ahead! We are very thankful the NPF Board saw the merit of Kindness Month and it's far reaching implications on not only our community but to the city as well! Special thanks to our rockstar Desert Shores resident's Donna Toussaint and Lynn Rosenberg who made their way to city hall and presented our Kindness Month proposal to the grant board. We appreciate the time and effort spent in preparation and delivering the message!

- 1. Check in with a friend or family member you haven't heard from in a while to make sure they're doing well.

- 3. Compliment a loved one in the morning to make their day bright as it starts.
- 4. Smile or give a friendly nod at a stranger you see while on a walk or doing errands.

- 6. Put a whiteboard or some poster board out in your home for family members to write nice messages for each other.
- 7. Leave some treats or a small gift on a neighbor's doorstep.
- 8. If you have old clothes or toys you can do without, donate them to charity.
- 9. Gather up any recyclable items like plastic or paper you have sitting around and take them to a recycling plant to treat the earth kindly.
- 10. If you can afford it and are comfortable doing so, tip a waiter or waitress more than you usually would while eating at a restaurant.
- 11. It's important to have compassion for yourself, too! Make time for one act of self-care each day, like going on a walk or eating a nutritious meal.

- 12. Help a loved one with something they've been struggling to complete, like homework or a big project.
- 13. Give a hug to someone who needs one.
- 14. Write a note to someone you care about with the top reasons you love them.
- 15. If you're in line at the grocery store and have some extra time, let someone else go in front of you.
- 16. Ask a loved one how their day went, and if they're struggling, find ways to help.
- 17. Place sticky notes with encouraging words in places for strangers or loved ones to find them.
- 18. While making dinner, double your recipe (if you can) and send a meal to someone in need.
- 19. Forgive someone who you've been struggling with for a while-if not to be kind to them, then to be kind to yourself.
- 20. Pick up trash around your neighborhood or a nearby park.

# 15 Ways to Be a Good Neighbor

Whenever we move to a new neighborhood, or someone moves into ours, we always worry about getting "good" neighbors. But do we every really stop to think about all the ways that we can be better for our fellow community members? Here are 20 ways to make sure we are all doing our part.

- 1. Take pride in your neighborhood: One way to be a good neighbor is to simply take pride in your neighborhood. Embrace it for what it is, find out what you can do to make it better and tell others about how much you love your community.
- 2. Help maintain shared spaces: Good neighbors don't just take care of their home and yard. They also look out for the shared spaces, like easements, islands and neighborhood parks.
- 3. Limit late or loud parties: Outdoor summer parties are the best, but going late and being loud is a burden on your neighbors. You should definitely have fun in your own home, but consider your neighbors' needs, and limit the noise and activity during sleeping hours.
- 4. Introduce yourself: You don't have to become best friends with everyone in your neighborhood. You also don't have to drag around well-stocked welcome wagons. But introducing yourself and learning names is just a good neighbor thing.
- 5. Be mindful of pet poop: Pick up after your pets every time. Don't be the dump-and-run neighbor.
- 6. Quiet your barking dog: Bring barking dogs inside, especially if you're not going to be home. It's better for them, and you won't drive your neighbors crazy.
- 7. Attend neighborhood meetings and events: Get involved in your neighborhood. You don't have to make it your fulltime side project (unless you want to), but know who in the city represents you, go to neighborhood meetings once in awhile and attend local events when you can. Bonus points for going with a neighbor!
- **8. Don't be defensive:** If someone asks you to quiet down or lets you know your barking dog is making them crazy, don't get defensive. Listen, apologize, figure out a solution. If you think their accusations aren't your fault, mention it calmly and offer to help find out what is really going on.
- 9. Say hello: Saying hi is easy and can really make someone's day. It's also a way to connect with others without having to delve deeply into a relationship. Even if you prefer a bit of distance from the people you live around, say-

ing hello obligates you to no one-but it does help you earn some of the benefits of a close-knit neighborhood, such as safety and others looking out for you.

- **10. Be trustworthy:** Show your neighbors you're trustworthy by signing for their packages when they're not home, bringing them mail that was delivered to you or mentioning that you haven't seen them in awhile and wanted to make sure they're OK.
- 11. Offer to help lift or carry things: On move-in day, offer to help with the heavy, awkward couch. Or if you see them bringing in a new water heater, ask if you can hold the door. Offer to help lift and carry if you're able, even if it's something small.
- **12. Show you trust them:** Show your neighbor that you trust her by asking her to keep an extra set of your keys for emergencies. Of course, make sure you trust her first!
- 13. Invite neighbors to parties: When you have big parties that aren't tied to a specific celebration, invite your neighbors. Not only will you build your bonds with them and show them your generosity, but you'll also buy a little extra late-night time and forgiveness for your loud best friend.
- 14. Resolve disputes in person: Resolve disputes with neighbors first by meeting face to face. Going after someone in the online Facebook group is always a recipe for disaster. If face-to-face doesn't work, then try email and posted letters. Your city might also have an office with mediators who can help you resolve disputes that may require a neutral party.
- **15.** Be generous with compliments: Let your neighbors know what you like about them: their kindness, their Christmas decorations, their kids. Good neighbors notice and say something.

# Can't We All Just Get Along?

We all can just get along. The key? Communication. It's often the best way to prevent and resolve conflict before it reaches the legal system. You don't have to be friends or spend time together to achieve a peaceful coexistence, but you should try to be a good neighbor and follow these tips:

Say hello. At the mailbox, while walking the dog or when you see a moving van arrive, introduce yourself. Learn your neighbors' names and regularly offer a friendly greeting.

**Provide a heads up.** If you're planning a construction project, altering your landscaping or hosting a big party, contact your neighbors beforehand.

Do unto others. Treat neighbors as you would like to be treated. Be considerate about noise from vehicles, stereos, pets, etc.

Know your differences. Make an effort to understand each other. Differences in age, ethnic background and years in the neighborhood can lead to different expectations or misunderstandings.

**Consider the view.** Keep areas of your property that others can see presentable.

Appreciate them. If the neighbors do something you like, let them know. They'll be pleased you noticed, and it'll be easier to talk later if they do something you don't like.

**Stay positive.** Most people don't try to create problems. If a neighbor does something that irritates you, don't assume it was deliberate.

Talk honestly. Tolerance is important, but don't let a real irritation go because it seems unimportant or hard to discuss. Let your neighbors know if something they do annoys.


Be respectful. Talk directly to your neighbors if there's a problem. Gossiping with others can damage relationships and create trouble.

Remain calm. If a neighbor mentions a problem they have with you, thank them for the input. You don't have to agree or justify any behavior. Wait for any anger to subside before responding.

Listen carefully. When discussing a problem, try to understand your neighbor's position and why he or she feels that way.

**Take your time.** Take a break to think about what you and your neighbor have discussed. Arrange to finish the conversation at another time.
